Our region

Situated just 90 minutes' drive north of Sydney and south of Newcastle, the Central Coast is home to 40+ beaches, beautiful lakes, National Parks and thriving hospitality venues.



One of Australia's most popular coastal destinations, the Central Coast includes major localities and towns such as Gosford, Wyong, Terrigal, Woy Woy and The Entrance.

The area is the third-largest urban area in New South Wales and the ninth-largest urban area in Australia.

The region has a humid, subtropical climate, with warm humid summers and mild winters. Rainfall is spread fairly evenly throughout the year, but is slightly more frequent during autumn.

Getting around

The Central Coast region has transport infrastructure that provides integrated links both within the region, and to the rest of New South Wales and Australia.

The area is easily accessible via public transport including buses and trains, which operate regularly between the Central Coast, Sydney and Newcastle, as well as Sydney and Newcastle Airports for domestic and international travel.

Health and safety

Emergency services

In an emergency, you should always call **000** to be connected to Police, Fire or Ambulance services.

For assistance for flood, storms and natural disasters, please contact the NSW State Emergency Services (NSW SES) on 132 500.

For non-urgent police assistance, reporting minor crime and all general enquiries, please contact the Police Assistance Line on 131 444.

Getting medical assistance

To find a doctor in your area, use the 'Find a Health Service' tool on the <u>Healthdirect website</u>: <u>healthdirect.gov.au</u>

You can search for the kind of doctor you need and find out if they bulk bill. It's best to bring your Medicare card or number with you when you see your doctor.

Applying for Medicare

The Australian Government has a universal health care system known as Medicare, which has been put in place to help with the cost of certain medical assistance and treatments.

You can apply for Medicare if you live in Australia and meet certain other requirements.

To apply, you will need to provide a number of different documents, depending on your circumstances.

Learning about your work rights in Australia

Workplace laws in Australia generally apply equally to all workers employed in Australia.

Employers engaging foreign workers must ensure that they comply with both Australian workplace laws and immigration laws.

Australian currency and opening a bank account

There are many banks available for you to choose from, and it is often easiest to visit a branch of your chosen bank inperson, so that they can guide you on your account choices and what identity documents are required.

Australia's national currency is the Australian dollar (AUD) which comes in plastic notes of \$5, \$10, \$20, \$50 and \$100.

Coins are in 5, 10, 20 and 50 cent denominations, as well as \$1 and \$2 denominations.

Tax and superannuation details and requirements

All workers in Australia are required to pay income tax, and also have the right to superannuation payments from their employer.

To be eligible to work in Australia, all employees require a tax file number (TFN). A TFN is free and identifies you for tax and superannuation purposes.

Driving on our local roads

Your driver's licence

To drive or ride a motorised vehicle in Australia, you must hold a valid driver's licence.

Shopping opportunities

- Erina Fair: Located in Erina, this is the largest shopping centre on the Central Coast, and has been servicing the region since 1987. It features a number of major retailers, as well as 300+ specialty stores.
- Westfield Tuggerah: The second largest shopping centre on the Central Coast, it features free parking as well as an impressive outdoor dining area that includes a unique water playground.
